Dear Friends and Neighbors:


It is with a heavy heart that I write this message. The RMA is mourning the passing of one of our most ardent supporters, Sandi Genser-Maack (December 2, 1945 - November 26, 2017). Sandi was a tireless advocate for history preservation and education in the City of Richmond and greater East Bay. Her sudden passing leaves the RMA board, staff and volunteers in a state of shock and sadness.

Sandi was involved with the RMA in several capacities since the early 1990s. In 1992, she assumed the staff position of volunteer and outreach coordinator, a job she held until 1997. Sandi then joined the board in 2008 as the Recording Secretary and remained in that position as a board member until 2015 when she assumed the Vice Presidency. Sandi and Lynn, her husband of 49 years, were consummate collectors of many things, including all types of Richmond memorabilia and items from other local cities, with a particular fondness for the wares of the Technical Porcelain and Chinaware Company (TEPCO) of El Cerrito. In 2007, they staged what is likely the only exhibition about TEPCO in history at the Museum, called *“Tiptoe through the Tepco,”* which was one of our most popular exhibits.

Please join Sandi’s family in a celebration of her life on Sunday December 17, 2017, 1:00 - 4:30 PM, at the Richmond Country Club. Sandi will be sorely missed by everyone in the community. Life is so short and precious. Enjoy this holiday season with your loved ones.

SEEKING JEWISH COMMUNITY HISTORY IN RICHMOND

Help us tell the story of the Jewish Community in Richmond & Contra Costa County

The Richmond Museum of History is planning an exhibition called *“Pioneers to Present: Jews of Richmond and Contra Costa County”* to open in November 2018 honoring the contributions of the Jewish community in Richmond and greater Contra Costa County. The exhibition developed out of our work on the *History Unfolded* project in support of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, for which we searched through copies of the Richmond Daily Independent and Richmond Record Herald newspapers held in the Museum collection for coverage of holocaust-related events. The results of our efforts in support of the *History Unfolded* project will be part of the exhibition in November.

The exhibition committee is developing biographical information about significant Jewish individuals in Richmond and greater Contra Costa County. We also want to hear from you! Do you have information related to local Jewish people in the past and present? We welcome information about Jewish-owned businesses and people from all walks of life.

The Museum seeks community support in uncovering local Jewish history and is asking that people who know about aspects of Jewish history in the area, including stories about individuals, communities and businesses contact the Museum at (510) 235-7387 or Melinda@richmondmuseum.org.

HISTORY UNFOLDED

The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum (USHMM) is asking citizen historians to help them track coverage of events in American newspapers leading up to the holocaust in Europe. The Richmond Museum of History has contributed coverage from the Richmond Daily Independent and the Richmond Record Herald, and is seeking people to search Oakland, San Francisco and other newspapers. We will share the results of the research with the public in the form of an exhibit opening in November 2018.

December 21: "**Father Goose**" (1964) Cary Grant, Leslie Caron, Trevor Howard.

During World War II, a man persuaded to live on an isolated island and spot aircraft finds himself responsible for a teacher and several students, all female. A delightful movie. Adventure, comedy, romance.

February 15: "**The Cuckoo**" (2002) Anni-Kristiina Juuso, Ville Haapasalo, Viktor Bychkov.

The Cuckoo is a 2002 Russian historical comedy-drama film directed by Aleksandr Rogozhkin. It takes place during World War II from the perspective of opposing Soviet and Finnish soldiers stranded at a Sami woman's farmhouse. Drama, war, comedy.

March 15: "**Everything is Illuminated**" (2002) Elijah Wood, Eugene Hutz, Boris Leskin.

A young Jewish American man (Elijah Wood), with the help of an eccentric local, endeavors to find the woman who saved his grandfather during World War II in a Ukrainian village that was ultimately razed by the Nazis. Comedy, drama.

April 19: "**Das Boot**" (1981) Jürgen Prochnow, Herbert Grönemeyer, Klaus Wennemann.

The claustrophobic world of a WWII German U-boat; boredom, filth, and sheer terror. Riveting. Adventure, drama, thriller.

May 17: "**Memoirs of a Geisha**" (2005) Zhang Ziyi, Ken Watanabe, Gong Li, Michelle Yeoh.

The story of a young Japanese girl who is sold by her impoverished family to a geisha house and becomes one of Japan's most celebrated geisha. Drama, romance.

FROM THE *RED OAK VICTORY* SHIP

The crew of the *Red Oak Victory* is looking forward to a well-deserved rest over the Christmas and New Year's holidays. 2017 was easily the busiest and best year ever for the Ship in a number of ways. We presented five major public events including two Swing Dances with the fabulous Stompy Jones band; an Evening of Jazz with the John Kalleen Group; a Vietnam Veteran's commemoration strongly supported by the Vietnam Helicopter Pilots Association, the Pacific Bus Museum, and the Eagle Field Foundation; a wonderful educational day in conjunction with the NPS "Rosie Rally"; and the most successful July 3 Independence Day fireworks event we have ever held.

We also can't forget the six Pancake Breakfast fundraisers, which continue to be a popular event with the local Richmond community and beyond.

2017 was our best year ever in terms of public outreach and revenue generation. We plan to continue this growth in 2018 with a new series of Pancake Breakfasts and public events.

Of course, none of this is possible without the terrific crew of volunteers. Whether they were greeting visitors, taking tickets, parking cars, conducting tours, operating the winches, slaving away in the galley or serving dinner guests, every member of the *Red Oak Victory* crew worked hard to make these events a success.

As all of this was taking place, our engineering and deck crew were hard at work behind the scenes getting the Ship ready for the light-off of the engines in 2018. This will be a major event not just for the *Red Oak Victory* but for the historic ship community in general. Our engine light-off will be first time in 38 years that a historic World War II steam ship engine has been brought back to life, and the first time in nearly 50 years that the *Red Oak Victory* has rumbled with the sound of her own turbines. The publicity resulting from this event will be a real boon to the Ship and to the Richmond community.

Group visits to the Ship have always been an important feature of our repertoire, and this continued in 2017. Local car clubs, bike clubs, and community groups have all visited the Ship in 2017, but I think I speak for the rest of the crew when I say the most fun and satisfying visits are those by school and scouting groups. Most recently we hosted a group of Cub Scouts from Hercules who toured the Ship, learned about navigation and watched the cargo winches in operation.

Another new and important element for the Ship in 2018 is a re-doubled effort to rent the Ship's spaces out for business meetings, parties, weddings, photo location shoots and other functions. To extend our marketing reach, we are going to be listing many of the Ship's spaces on Peerspace, a service which covers the entire Bay Area with rental space offerings. We will be up and running on Peerspace around the first of the year.

I started this column praising our volunteer crew members, and so it is appropriate that I close by reminding everyone that recruiting for volunteers is an on-going effort. We are currently looking for greeters, docents, deck hands and even a videographer. But of course, anyone with an interest in historic ships and the time to devote is welcome as a volunteer. Regardless of their skill set, we can always find an important contribution for them to make.


